

toledo's VVarehouse district

Before the turn


Before the turn of the 20th century, Toledo ranked as one of the largest rail centers west of New York City. The city's location along the river near Lake Erie, the terminus for the Miami and Erie canal, and a proximity to the rich agricultural lands available in the "Northwest Territory" all afforded a time of strong development on the nation's north coast. It is against this backdrop that Toledo grows to become a major city. Our Founders Dining Room reminds us of many titans of industry and knowledge that called Toledo home. And as the early 20th century progressed, we saw the city environs take shape.

Near the railroad's Middlegrounds, now Owens Corning Headquarters, and adjacent to the navigable Swan Creek, many of the industrial/storage and distribution structures developed south of and adjacent to the burgeoning central business district. That area is what we now refer to as the Warehouse District. The area 1 is roughly defined as that south of Monroe Street, along the Maumee River to the High Level Bridge and west to Michigan Avenue.






1 The Warehouse District is generally defined as the area south of Monroe Street extending to the High Level Bridge, and from the river west to Michigan Avenue.


It is in this area that we see structures both large and small constructed with care and design in an era when even the basic two-story storefront was an example of the refined and proportional design that ruled the architecture of the day.

Much of the renaissance we attribute to downtown recently has its roots in the "never surrender" attitude exhibited by the Toledo Warehouse District Association (TWDA) formed in the late 1980s. Building owners, preservationists and interested parties took a stand and said the architecture south of Monroe Street had significance. Indeed, three of the four National Register Historic Districts in downtown are in the Warehouse District. The TWDA sought to reinvigorate and save the area at a time when surface parking was making a dent in the urban fabric.

The architecture of the Warehouse District is predominantly what is referred to as Commercial Italianate — a base (usually a storefront or office), a middle section of windows, topped off with a series of arched windows and a cornice of some type ②. While other styles also saw the 1870s to 1920s as a period of growth, it was a time rife with brick as the primary building material. The Great Chicago Fire prompted the use of brick and the development of fire walls. Few wood-framed buildings remained, although the wood was still used for floors. As an exterior material in most urban areas, brick and stone were the material of choice. Cast iron columns ③ and pressed metal (tin) cornices can be seen throughout the district, emblematic of the Commercial Italianate features.

One of the most important remaining streets in the city is South St. Clair Street. St. Clair Village (or Dixon block, as it is often called) is really the St. Clair Historic District. This is the reason that our expressway enters downtown the way it does and why we see the river.

When the Washington Street exit and expressways were being developed, a plan existed that had an expressway running through the Historic Church of St. Patrick and basically through Standart Lofts, Grumpys, Spaghetti Warehouse, and destroying St. Clair Street. The







expressway would then turn left (north), running along the river to I-280. See the photo, above right 4, showing a model of this plan.

A letter from John Nobel Richards AIA (YMCA, Commodore Perry), past National President of the American Institute of Architects (AIA) and Toledo Club member, was sent to the Federal authorities in charge. The letter spoke to the importance of a grouping of buildings on St. Clair Street. Because of this, we have a sweeping curve along Indiana to Washington Street, and all the buildings south of Washington were saved.

In 1999, plans moved forward for a group of five buildings 5 at St. Clair and Lafayette that would be connected at the second floor, creating 11 apartments above a series of storefronts. This began the St. Clair Village apartment project, and it was completed at approximately the same time the Mud Hens moved to Fifth Third Field. The project received Federal Historic Tax Credits, and is considered a catalyst project that inspired the continued development across the street and set the tone for the Hensville project of 2013.




Fifth Third Field ③, to its credit, is located between two National Register Historic Districts (St. Clair Street and Huron Street). No other major or minor league baseball stadiums in the nation have been located in such a manner. The ballpark has been a gigantic shot in the arm for downtown in general, and the Warehouse District in particular. The ballpark is a great neighbor and has seen the development of The Blarney, Gathered Glass Studios, Graphite Design Build, and The Berdan Building Apartments. This, coupled with the Durty Bird, Home Slice Pizza, Maddie and Bella and several residential developments, has made St. Clair Street one of the city's best.

Ten years after the opening of the ballpark, the Mud Hens took ownership of a series of buildings located at the corner of Lafayette and Washington. This made sense in light of the Mud Hens/Walleye offices being located adjacently in 406 Washington. The buildings, originally obtained by the county for the construction of the convention center, were protected by a Memorandum of Agreement with the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation. Indeed, the buildings were falling into the street at one point, and to the county's credit they lived up to their end of the agreement by stabilizing the buildings. These buildings were part of what has become Hensville , a multi-use renovation completed by the Mud Hens in 2016.

Least we forget, the origins of the warehouse district started with a respect for architecture and a vitality for the community. That vitality is reflected in a shared resource for many in our area, namely the Toledo Farmers' Market. Renovated to its current configuration around 1990 with the help of the fledgling Warehouse District Association and Marcy Kaptur's office, the structure continues to provide fresh produce and crafts to a large area of Northwest Ohio and Southeastern Michigan.

The strength and beauty of architecture and the community that cares about it has made the Warehouse District the place to gather downtown. Whether taking in a ball game, enjoying








of Toledo's High Level Bridge.



a concert or partaking of beverages, the Warehouse District provides a well-appointed stage on which a large part of the life of Toledo continues to thrive. This, coupled with over 500 new living units in the past decade, a new Metropark and Toledo's first craft brewery (Maumee Bay Brewing), makes the Warehouse District the neighborhood of choice for many in a resurging Toledo. @

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Say What?

WHERE DID THAT EXPRESSION COME FROM?

Finally, summer has arrived after a very cold and rainy spring. Our Toledo Club members are ready to golf, swim, grill and, for a lucky group, put a boat in the water. Don't we all come from a seafaring background? As volunteer or forced immigrants, a boat brought our ancestors here.

Naval engineering, navigation and exploration have played a large part in creating the term "civilization." In fact, our language is sprinkled with naval terms. Some are fairly obvious and others are hiding their association with "liquid flotation." Here are a few to contemplate. Is the definition accurate or an "urban legend"? Yours to decide.

AS THE CROW FLIES When lost or unsure of their position in coastal waters, ships would release a caged crow. The crow would fly straight towards the nearest land, thus giving the vessel some sort of a navigational fix. The tallest lookout platform on a ship came to be known as the crow's nest.

LET THE CAT OUT OF THE BAG In the Royal Navy the punishment of choice was flogging. This was administered by the bosun's mate using a whip called a cat o' nine tails. The "cat" was kept in a leather or baize bag, baize being a coarse woolen material with a nap on one side. Punishment came when the cat was let out of the bag. Ok, we're still on the punishment subject.

OVER THE BARREL The unfortunate sailor to be flogged was tied to a grating, a mast or over the barrel of a deck cannon. Someone in a bad position is "over the barrel."

FIRST RATE This term has always implied excellence. From the 16th century until steam-powered ships took over, British naval ships were rated as to the number of heavy cannons they carried. A ship of 100 or more guns was a first rate line-of-battle ship. Second rates carried 90 to 98 guns; third rates 64 to 89 guns and fourth rates 50 to 60 guns. Frigates carrying 48 to 20 guns were fifth and sixth rated.

THE BITTER END | always had a different definition than the nautical one. See what you think. The end of an anchor cable is fastened to the bitts at the ship's bow. If all of the anchor cable has been "payed out" you have come to the bitter end.

SLUSH FUND A slushy slurry of fat was obtained by boiling or scraping the empty salted meat storage barrels. This stuff called "slush" was often sold ashore by the ship's cook for the benefit of himself or the crew. The money so derived became known as a slush fund. Bet you never guessed this one.

SCUTTLEBUTT A butt was a barrel; to scuttle meant to chop a hole in something. The scuttlebutt was a water barrel with a hole cut into it so that sailors could reach in and dip out drinking water. The scuttlebutt was also the place where the ship's gossip was exchanged. Human nature never changes. Witness the modern office water cooler.

GARBLED Garbling was the prohibited practice of mixing rubbish with the cargo. We use this term today when referring to a distorted, mixed-up message.

GROGGY British Admiral Vernon's nickname was "Old Grogram" for his cloak of grogram, a scratchy mix of silk and wool. In 1740, he ordered that the sailors' daily ration of rum be diluted with water. Needless to say, this was not a popular move and the sailors titled the mixture "grog."

Many thanks to Captain Mary Dalby for her presentation to my historical group, Questers. It was a great introduction about how nautical terms are intertwined into our everyday conversation.


Upcoming summer events

Tasting NOTES from The Old Wine Guy

Mouton: The **Out** of Wine,

The world is awash with red wine. Most of it is very drinkable but ordinary. Yet there are a great many good red wines from many countries around the world. In Toledo, every wine shop and most large supermarkets will have up to 100 decent-to-good California red wines, but very little from other countries. Drink them, enjoy them, but realize that they are not the best of the best.

The greatest red wine for centuries has come from France. Most come from the Bordeaux area, although Burgundy produces outstanding wines. The problem is that in Toledo and most of the surrounding area, the Bordeaux growers and shippers have priced their wine so high that one cannot find these great bottles.

One of the greatest of the Bordeaux reds is Chateau Mouton Rothschild. It was purchased by a branch of the

Rothschild family in 1873, and since 1945, the Victory Year, has featured an original work of art by one of the great living artists on its label. Some of the labels are so impressive that empty bottles with these labels can be found for sale on eBay.

1973 was a great year for Mouton and its owner, Baron Philippe de Rothschild. It was the 100-year anniversary of the family's ownership of Mouton, and more importantly Mouton was officially classified as a "first growth." The classification of 1855 had called it the "first of the second growths," a mistake that took well over 100 years to rectify. To celebrate, the Baron used a brilliant masterpiece of Picasso on its label. The original can be seen in the Museum of Wine at Mouton, a must-see for anyone going to Bordeaux.

the Wine of Art

With the "Bordeaux boys" setting their prices close to the "per-ounce" price of gold, I was able to find only one bottle of Mouton for sale in western Toledo. If we cannot frequently enjoy Mouton the wine, we can at least enjoy the art of Mouton. The photographs of Mouton bottles shown here were taken in the cellars of the old wine guy and his son, the middle-aged wine guy.

The best way to enjoy great Bordeaux is to have it shipped in from the large dealers in New York, Chicago or San Francisco. The old wine guy depends upon his son, the middle-aged wine guy, who closely follows the major wine auctions. When a great wine at an excellent price comes up at auction, the middle-aged wine guy hits the buy key.

In our family we try to drink and enjoy good wine and an occasional bottle of great wine. Try to build a wine cellar; start small, and do some reading. Never sell a bottle—it would be like selling the family dog.







Behind the Lens

John Kuser

Have you seen our *Topics* photographers at The Toledo Club events? They work hard and show both our members and events in the best photographic way. We're beginning our bio series of these professionals with John Kuser. There are more great ones to follow!

The Kuser family came from Trenton, NJ to Napoleon, OH in 1966 so that they could purchase the Northwest Signal newspaper. Local newspapers help create the identity of a region, and the Kuser family did so in the Napoleon area for 37 years, until 2004.

In 1974, John's parents recognized his talent and gifted him a camera when he graduated from Napoleon High School. During the 70s, 80s and 90s he photographed rock concerts, including Led Zeppelin, Aerosmith, Queen, Styx, Journey, Pink Floyd, and more. John had his photographs published on such items as catalogs, brochures, phone book covers and restaurant menus. Photographing rock concerts doesn't create a great way to consistently put food on the table, but John has found other ways to channel his love of rock music. He plays guitar with an acoustic group called "Dirty Lies," as well as spends time running a recording studio.

At the Signal, John wore many hats, doing such jobs as circulation manager and part-time photographer. He worked in the darkroom (yes, there was a life before digital photography). He also taught reporters at the Signal how to use film cameras and the best ways to set up shots.

John's photography career was really a dream come true, and he credits the support of his wife, Betsy. He loves what he does, which has included photographing a wide variety of subjects, from weddings (over 600 from Alaska to Florida) and families, to sports and more. His clients range from major corporations, including Sweetwater, Northwest State



Community College, United Way, Owens Corning, Sprint, S.S.O.E. and B.N.I., to smaller mom and pop businesses.

John is honored to be a member of The Toledo Club, and looks forward to meeting new people. His philosophy is that life's journey is not so much the places you've been, but the people you meet along the way.





Judge Denise Navarre Cubbon was the recipient of the Director's Award at the Lucas County Committee for Children's annual dinner, recognizing local individuals and organizations that have advanced the cause of protecting Lucas County children from abuse and neglect. The event was held at The Pinnacle in Maumee.

Denise is the lead judge of the county's juvenile and child welfare courts. She was elected in 2004, and became the head of the juvenile court in 2007. In January 2009 she was appointed to serve on the Supreme Court of Ohio Advisory Committee on Children, Families & the Courts.

A member of the board of trustees for the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges, Denise was instrumental in the development of an array of intervention points aimed at working with more offenders in the community. The county Assessment Center routes low-risk and many first-time delinquents toward diversion programs and monitoring that can prevent a criminal record. Other youth are referred to Youth Advocate Programs, a nonprofit contractor that provides professional mentors who enable the county to keep some serious offenders safely at home instead of behind bars. The county also operates a youth treatment center that focuses on family involvement, therapy and academic acceleration.

Prior to taking the bench, Denise served as a Lucas County assistant prosecuting attorney for 23 years, assigned to the juvenile division, criminal division, and senior protection unit. She earned her BA degree in anthropology and a Juris Doctor degree from The University of Toledo College of Law. She is an active community member, having served and held leadership positions on several not-for-profit organizations and task forces. She and her husband Stuart F. Cubbon, a Board-Certified Civil Trial Advocate, joined The Toledo Club in June 1994. Stuart is a partner and president of Cubbon and Associates. He and Denise have four children and five grandchildren.

Monsignor Michael Billian, pastor of St. Joseph's Parish in Sylvania, was honored with the Jewish Federation of Greater Toledo's "Spirit of Jewish Family Service Award" at the Federation's annual meeting on June 18. 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


