Turkey Buffets as well as a Sunday brunch once per month.



135-acre campus. 429,000 square feet of facilities. Over 1,250 full- and part-time employees. A payroll of \$61 million per year. \$35 million per year in expenses for operations and construction. In addition to these impressive statistics, the 180th Fighter Wing, located out by Eugene Krantz Toledo Express Airport, also provides complete firefighting capability for that airport, as well as mutual aid to 14 local fire departments.

The 180th Fighter Wing sounds like an impressive operation even before you learn that its primary mission is to maintain immediate flight readiness for a fleet of 21 state-of-the-art F-16 Fighting Falcon fighter jets, and the pilots who fly them; as well as a 24/7 Homeland Defense unit that is available to protect an area covering 60% of the U.S. population.

The 180th Fighter Wing has a long history dating from 1917 in Ohio, and to the 1950s in Toledo. And it also has a long history of mutual respect between the Fighter Wing and The Toledo Club.

According to the base commander, Colonel Chad E. Holesko, who we interviewed on June 1, 2023, northwest Ohio is a great place for the 180th, because of the pride, culture and values of northwest Ohioans. He believes that a key reason for the success of his unit—one that consistently

achieves the highest ratings of any Air National Guard base in the country—is largely due to that culture and those values. After nearly three years as head of the maintenance unit at the 180th, Col. Holesko was elevated to his role as base commander in 2022. As a fighter pilot with over 3,500 hours at the stick of F-16s, including 47 hours of combat flight, Holesko understands the scope of the unit's mission, as well as its importance.

SMSgt Beth Holliker led the tour of the 180th for The Toledo Club contingent on June 1.













"Over 60% of the U.S. population is within 600 miles of our base; under NORAD command we have responded to over 1,120 events in support of national defense, civil aviation, and in support of civil authorities since 2008," reports Col. Holesko. In addition, airmen from the 180th have deployed to both Iraq and Afghanistan since 2004, and to many other countries, in support of U.S. national interests. All of these missions have been accomplished while the unit has maintained NORAD's highest rating of "Mission Ready" nearly every year for the past 15 years. According to Holesko, Air Force leadership asks other units: "Why can't you do what Toledo does?"

uring our visit, we were driven to a vantage point to observe, within 100 feet of the runway, some of the Wing's F-16s take off for a training mission. Seeing and hearing the awesome power of these jet fighters as they accelerate rapidly down the runway and then shoot suddenly vertically upward as they reach the end of the runway is

hard to describe. While we wore mandatory ear protection, the sound and fury of the jets could be both felt and heard as they thundered across our vantage point, already moving almost too fast for our eyes to follow. As our guide SMSgt Beth Holliker said, "That's the sound of freedom!"

As the 180th protects Toledo (and far beyond), Toledo has also supported the 180th, through its political leaders, good recruitment numbers from the community, and great partnerships with local governments and authorities. The Toledo Club began having its Military Dinner in 2002, following the 9/11 attacks, and has held such a dinner every year since, except one in the pandemic years. The Club invites ten members of each branch to the dinner, including from the 180th. Each base Commander since 002 has attended at least one dinner. In 2013, the 180th presented a replica F-16 Fighting Falcon fighter tail to The Toledo Club that is proudly displayed above the big table in the Oak Room.

or the future, to remain a viable and critical base in the next fifty years, the base will need funding to continue to build its maintenance and deployment infrastructure. It will also need to acquire the next generation of aircraft, such as the F-35s now being built and deployed by the U.S. Air Force. According to Col. Holesko, he has support from within the military and from the community to begin replacing his fleet of F-16s with F-35s on a one-for-one basis.

Col. Holesko reports that the unit has approximately 150 applicants for every pilot position. The basic qualifications to be accepted and trained to be a pilot for the Air National Guard are a college education and a private pilot's license, along with additional age and physical/mental fitness requirements. But the benefits of service in the National Guard are many, including financial support for education, free flights and boarding on a space-available basis around the world, and a monthly stipend. And who knows, you might qualify to become a pilot, and fly one of those 21 F-16s (or maybe an F-35, when they are part of the 180th Fighter Wing).

We were able to watch as maintenance crews prepared and conducted the F-16's pre-flight inspections, and then we watched as the pilots again checked their aircraft, strapped in, and then checked out the operation of the jets flaps and other controls after firing up the engines. They took plenty of time getting ready, but we were assured that should there be a real emergency, and a need for them to get in the air, they can do so much more quickly. How quickly? Don't ask—it's classified.


n September, 2001, when the twin towers in New York City were attacked, F-16s from the 180th Fighter Wing were ordered into the air to intercept United Flight 93, after it was determined that it might be heading back toward Washington, DC. The passengers on that plane stormed the cockpit and brought down the plane before the F-16s reached it, and our hosts told us that those jets then flew around the midwest airspace, signaling to any aircraft still in the air that they should land immediately.

As a tribute to the unit's participation in the events of 9/11 and to honor the innocent lives lost that day, a memorial was built on the base. One of only three memorials in the country with artifacts from each of the three crash sites that day, the memorial has pieces of steel beams from the New York World Trade towers (above), limestone blocks from the Pentagon (below left), and charred ground from the crash site of Flight 93 in Pennsylvania (below right), all arranged in a sundial arrangement. The sundial is positioned such that on September 11 each year, the flagpole in the middle casts a shadow right between the two beams from the towers at the precise time the south tower was hit by the first terrorist-controlled plane.

The memorial is located on the base, but members of the public can visit by making arrangements with the base public affairs superintendent, SMSgt Beth Holliker, who was also our guide during our visit.



20 North Gallery (18 N. Saint Clair), (pictured above) is the oldest independent art gallery in Toledo. This year the gallery celebrates its 30th anniversary. A pioneer, the 20 North Gallery made its debut at the start of the rebirth of the Warehouse District. Back in 1993, owner Eric Hillenbrand saw the need for a downtown gallery and envisioned the promise of the Warehouse District buildings. Being the first to bring a new business to the virtually deserted street, the gallery was referred to as a "Glowing Oasis" by The Blade. The lights would glow from within at night, standing amongst the yet-to-be-refurbished unlighted buildings of North Saint Clair, hence the "glowing oasis."

Originally the gallery housed aspiring artists in lofts on the upper floors. Shortly after the gallery's opening, Peggy Grant joined Hillenbrand and became the art director. Peggy was a powerhouse with over 50 years of experience in the arts, and was very well connected

throughout the art world. When your Rolodex® contains direct lines to the directors and curators of the finest museums, galleries, regional artists, regional collectors, all the way up to the Smithsonian, that's connected! Peggy and Eric worked diligently until 2012, when Condessa Croninger stepped into the director's position, which she still holds today.

Thirty years after its creation, 20 North is still an important part of the Warehouse District and the arts community. But there's so much more to this gallery than being a first and a survivor.

> This gallery has class—it IS class. There is an unusually eclectic variety of carefully chosen art, created by wellresearched artists. It also has a feeling of tradition, of comfort. From entering through the late Victorian doorway, to the sound

underfoot of the well-polished wooden floors and the array of art that transcends time, it is unique. The atmosphere is elegant and comfortable.

The baby grand piano that has been played by jazz greats sits waiting for a soirée or special event, as does the elegant bar in the rear of the gallery. Glass works by regional artists present and past, amazing oils, neon lights and jewelry as wearable art. all mediums are

represented, whether permanently or during a show. This gallery is truly a jewel.

The artwork in the studio is roughly 75% regional, but also has a good showing of national, and sometimes international, works. There have been showings from Poland, Russia, and Japan, to mention a few. 20 North has four to five shows annually, and always has an amazing selection of art.

Continually looking for new patrons and new artists, Eric and Condessa would love to hear from you, and invite you to visit the gallery. In Eric's words "it's an opportunity to explore the very best the Toledo art scene has to offer."

#### Gathered Glassblowing Studio

(23 N. Huron Street), which is a working glass studio, also has a wonderful gallery of glass items to peruse.

Sitting directly across the street from Fifth Third Field on North Huron Street, Gathered Glassblowing Studio stands out from the other businesses, with its bright blue door and window frames. Inside it has bare brick walls that are two feet thick, concrete floors, and a colorful array of glass objects. The space has a very urban studio feeling, raw, utilitarian, and yet beautiful. It has the feeling of studios in old Yorkville, Toronto, and 1960s SoHo. Glass "candy canes" of various colors and patterns are strung in the windows, and shelves are full of interesting figures and objects. The walls

hold large colorful, impressive works. It is truly fascinating.

This studio has the ability to make grand creations for clients. They've created everything from home furnishings for individuals, and impressive walls, lighting canopies and murals for corporations. Their work is displayed at many

businesses, synagogues, colleges, and parks. They work with the client to give them what they want, while using their own artistic eyes to guide and inspire the client, and their artistic

talent and skill set to bring such projects to fruition. Co-owner Mike Stevens explained that the team at Gathered Glassblowing Studio loves the big projects because they give more people a chance to encounter their work. Bringing art to the public on a daily basis is what they really want to do. Their artwork can be seen at some of Toledo's most-visited attractions: the

Toledo Zoo Aquarium houses their beautiful *Earth's Oceans* and the colorful *Jellyfish Smack*, and at Hensville there is a fence of their creation.

Workshops are also an important aspect of Gathered Glassblowing Studio. Workshops are available for individuals, small groups, and even date nights. Attendees have the experience of working with glass, leaving them with a new appreciation of the art form and a unique piece of art to take home.

Adam Goldberg, co-owner of Gathered Glassblowing Studio, gives onlookers a view of his love for the fluidity of glass.



The studio is the result of the dreams of three glass artists: Adam Goldberg, Eli Lipman, and the previously-mentioned Mike Stevens. They had a vision, and they didn't want to leave school to go

work for larger companies like most glass students do. They wanted to use their own artistic license and direct their own futures. The trio felt that Toledo was the place to set up shop, as this is where the American Studio Glass Movement originated. On May 11, 2012, Gathered Glassblowing Studio opened for business. Lipman has since left the Toledo area, but Mike Stevens and Adam Goldberg remain, and are now co-owners of the gallery. Both Mike and Adam were students at Bowling Green State University, where they met and earned their bachelor's degrees in fine arts. While there they both learned from artist

Scott Darlington. Mike is a native of Indianapolis, Indiana, where he started working with glass while still in high school. Adam, a Toledo native,





began his journey with glass at the age of 15 by taking classes at the Toledo Museum of Art.

Most of the art in the gallery is made by the Gathered team, but occasionally a piece made that they think deserves a spot in the showroom is displayed. The team members are, of course, Adam Goldberg and Mike Stevens. Also included are Jake Jones and Catherine Clement.

When a project requires sheet glass, it's acquired from Pilkington Glass, supporting the bigger local business that had ties to The Toledo Club.

Toledo is the Glass City, and some of our Club's founders were giants of the glass industry. For Toledo, glass as art matters.





Housed on the first floor of the historic Secor Hotel, it looks to be a wise move indeed.

The gallery is airy and spacious, with an enormous amount of natural lighting from the beautiful arched windows. It's reminiscent of a small European gallery. The room, in its simplicity, is

its own canvas of sorts. With the minimalistic style of the gallery, the art is the star. From an enticing stack of paintings in the corner that makes your fingers itch to be able to go through them, to the dedicated spaces for a single piece of art, it makes for a great experience. This is truly a classic gallery. The gallery's website states that they are a full-service gallery, offering rotating exhibitions of contemporary art from the Great Lakes Region. Owner Paula Baldoni did say that on rare occasions, older pieces and works from national artists may be included.

Having been involved in the arts in bigger cities (one of those being Boston), Ms. Baldoni has experienced art and life within the gallery world and understands what her clients want and

need She would love to see more promotion of local original art to more of the people of Toledo.


River House Arts houses anything from a large avant-garde (but totally


