n a snowy Saturday night in January, both the Toledo Symphony and the Toledo Jazz Orchestra were in performance. That afternoon, I waited in the Red Room to meet up with two men whose credentials are almost identical. They would each be conducting their orchestras that evening. They are among the best trombone players in the world. They are both Toledo Club members. They were coming to plan a unique concert in March where they would combine all their talents and similarities into one night of jazz.

Yes, Alain Trudel and Ron Kischuk will be on stage together, melding their trombones for your enjoyment.

You can experience their collaboration with the powerful Toledo Jazz Orchestra in a concert called "Jazz Meets the Symphony." The concert will be at 8 PM on March 6 at the Franciscan Center at Lourdes University.

Alain Trudel is a world-renowned trombone soloist who performs equally well in classical and jazz settings. Likewise, Ron Kischuk is expert in both genres.

"There is a misconception that the worlds of jazz and classical don't overlap," Kischuk remarked. "This concert is a chance for the community to see how the two worlds don't just coexist but can thrive together. I've been a fan of Alain's for years, so it's a thrill for me to play with him, and I believe it will be a thrill for the orchestra and audience as well."

The trombonists will be alternating feature numbers with the big band along with a smaller group performing arrangements of the famous J & K Quintet (trombonists J.J. Johnson and Kai Winding) of the 1950s, one of which has been arranged for full big band.

Also featured that evening will be "Flight of the Bumblebee," "Shining Hour," "Emily," "Too Little Time," and the Kai Winding original composition and arrangement, "Danish Blue."

In the Red Room, we listened to an astonishing big band recording of "Flight of the Bumblebee" and towards the end, Trudel picked up his trombone and spontaneously played along. Both trombonists loved the jazz version, with Trudel remarking that he plays the classical version all the time, but in a different key. The notes move so fast that it is hard to imagine such virtuosity on a slide instrument in *any* key.

Toledo Jazz Orchestra saxophonist and arranger, Russ Miller, is writing a new big band arrangement of Leroy Anderson's "Bugler's Holiday" to feature Alain and Ron along with TJO lead trombonist Scott Rogers.

Also programmed are several six-trombone ensemble pieces including "Round Midnight" from Slide Hampton's "World of Trombones," plus the John Clayton arrangement of "Sunny Side of the Street"

"Everybody gets a bit of love here and there, and then we'll play together," Trudel remarked as the discussion went on about the program.

But the talking had to end because both musicians were eager to pick up their 'bones and play the blues. What followed was the best of jazz as two talents merged in the moment, trading choruses, playing harmony and backing each other up in a sparkling spontaneous musical conversation. Two of a mind in action

"I consider myself one of Alain Trudel's biggest fans," says Toledo Symphony President and CEO Zak Vassar. "I first came to know Alain as a truly superb conductor. Since then, I've also come to admire his solid footing in jazz. The Symphony did an all-jazz concert last March, which featured Alain as a jazz soloist. As the concert began, I recognized a wholly separate part of Alain's musicianship. His performance was incredible by all measures, and he truly has the chops of a respected and vital jazz man. I really hope that Alain's appearance with Ron Kischuk and the TJO will give more people a chance to hear Alain in a new light. The concert also underscores his commitment to his inherited city of Toledo and its musical community, for Alain is a man who wants all of the performing arts to shine!"

Having enjoyed the privilege of hearing these two masters together, I personally can't wait for the moment they step out of the Red Room and onto the stage at the Franciscan Center backed by the Toledo Jazz Orchestra. Ron and Alain will make beautiful music together and I am sure that Toledo Club members will be proud of the bond we all share, as well as the depth of talent and leadership to be found in our roster.

lain Trudel is effervescent. His energy and enthusiasm fill any space he is in. Once, as I waited at lunchtime to meet with him in The Toledo Club's Founders Dining Room, he stopped at each table and spoke to everyone as if they were long-lost friends.

Speaking with him, I tried to pare down his love of music to five minutes, which was quite a task. This was not made easier by the fact that he loves jazz as much as classical, so he has one foot rooted in each genre.

Oh yes, one of the world's pre-eminent trombone players started out wanting to play the drums. Quite by accident, he was handed a valve trombone at age 12 when he joined a neighborhood band. He landed at 16th out of 16 trombone players. Good thing they didn't have 76 trombone players in that band!

Just two years later, Alain auditioned for the Conservatory of Montreal and took 4th place. Happily, numbers one and two decided not to attend, so he made the cut.

By age 16. Alain played with the Montreal Symphony Orchestra for the first time and leapt onto the international stage as the principal trombone with the Barcelona Symphony Orchestra at 18.

According to the Canadian Encyclopedia, Trudel is "widely considered the best trombonist in the world." Yamaha has designed a trombone mouthpiece to his specifications. As a soloist, he has performed with more than 20 orchestras in America and Europe. Happily, classical music wasn't quite enough for such a prodigy.

At age 20 he turned to jazz and played with a quartet named Bellows and Brass. He also played with a group dedicated to 19th century band music. Those who heard Alain perform jazz classics with the Toledo Symphony Orchestra last March experienced a masterful and moving evening.

Which brings us to the music that lured Alain back to the classics. It has it all—excitement, sorrow, aspiration and depression, all wrapped up in one piece.

The album is the Philadelphia Orchestra's performance of Shostakovich's "1st Cello Concerto' featuring Mstislav Rostropovich.

In the playing of the cello, with all its emotion, Alain said he instantly reconciled the freedom and emotion of jazz with the possibilities of classical music. He said that he would never see performing classical music as business as usual.



Rather, he sees each performance as an opportunity to be excellent by feeling the emotion in the music while being free from fears of making a mistake or miscue.

This liberating attitude extends to every member of the orchestra he now conducts.

He says emphatically, "I don't care if you miss a note once in a while as long as you feel the emotion." He firmly believes that if musicians don't take a chance, if they just play not to make mistakes, the music will not be interesting.

You may be wondering what Alain's favorite jazz might be. As a virtuoso jazz trombonist, I expected him to have a favorite moment featuring that instrument, maybe even a recording by Ron Kischuk. But no.

His favorite jazz moment is by tenor saxophonist John Coltrane. Such a lovely piece, "Naima," on Coltrane's 1959 album *Giant Steps*, again spotlights Alain's love of emotion in music. You should listen to it to feel for yourself the liberating freedom and beauty in this iconic performance on one of the greatest jazz albums of all time.

I hope everyone who reads this will have the opportunity, as I did, to sit down with Alain Trudel. You will see opportunities expand in your own life with his optimism and openness to free expression. I can only envy the musicians who work and perform with him.

Meet Ron


Ron Kischuk is completing his tenth season as artistic director of the Toledo Jazz Orchestra. He is a popular emcee for TJO concerts. He also is the leader of The Masters of Music Big Band, The Tartarsauce Traditional Jazz Band, and is the owner of Brassworks Entertainment in Detroit and The Masters Of Music Conservatory in Royal Oak. In 2016 he was selected for the second time as artistic director of the Birmingham Community House Jazz Series.

A member of the adjunct faculty of Wayne State University, Ron enjoys teaching classical and jazz trombone and trumpet, as well as the history of rock and roll. No stranger to classical music, he has been a featured soloist with The Detroit Symphony Orchestra and has performed with the orchestra as principal or assistant principal trombonist.

Ron is presently the principal trombonist of the Rochester Symphony Orchestra. He is lead trombonist for the Fox Theater in Detroit and Andiamo's Celebrity Showroom in Warren. His Masters of Music Big Band has backed up Johnny Mathis, Hal Linden, The Temptations, Natalie Cole, Gladys Knight, Rosemary Clooney, Wayne Newton, The Rat Pack and Regis Philbin among others.

Since 1980, the Toledo Jazz Orchestra has worked with dozens of industry legends, including Dizzy Gillespie, Joe Williams, Clark Terry, and Zoot Sims. The group also performs the works of the major big bands from the past eight decades, along with arrangements commissioned specifically for the orchestra. The Toledo Jazz Orchestra has two albums to its credit, Groovin' and Out of Nowhere 📭

Tickets for the March 6 concert can be ordered online at toledojazz.org or by calling 419-242-2787. With a Friday 8 PM curtain time, the timing is perfect to get some friends together for an early dinner in the FDR or Tavern, and then head to Sylvania for the concert at the Franciscan Center at Lourdes University.

THE GLASS CITY TEAM CHARITY CHALLENGE





Maybe right now you're thinking, "I'd really like to learn more about this mind-stuff and the philosophy of Yoga?"





Good Old Burgundy

France makes the greatest red wines in the world. Most of these come from Bordeaux, where the estates are quite large and


ownership of the estates only occasionally changes. Some estates make 10,000, 20,000, or more bottles of wine per vintage. You pretty much know what you are buying when you purchase a bottle from one of the great chateaux. Conversely, the estates of Burgundy are quite small, and wine bottled under a vineyard name such as Pommard can be made by more than a dozen different growers in more than a dozen different small plots. To buy Bordeaux you buy the chateaux; to buy Burgundy you buy the grower.



Recently, while visiting the middle-aged wine guy, he showed me an old Burgundy from the mid 1970s from his cellar. I immediately thought of a dusty bin in my cellar that I have not looked at for perhaps twenty years. The label on the bin simply said "good old Burgundy." The grape of red Burgundy is Pinot Noir. This is not the easiest grape to work with, but when nature gives us the right amount of sunshine and rain and when the proprietor (wine maker) is a master, the wine can be as great as any red wine produced in Bordeaux or anyplace else.

After thinking about old Burgundy, I went down to the cellar, got rid of the dust and cobwebs, and brought up six bottles of old Burgundy, totally forgotten for the last decade and had the beautiful and talented wife photograph these bottles. The 1995 Vosne-Romanne is from an area that produces many of the glories of Burgundy. The shipper, when the wine was made, was one of the young and best Burgundy wine makers. The 1969 Chambolle-Musigny once again comes from one of the great owners of Burgundy. Nineteen sixty-nine was a terrible year in Bordeaux but a great year in Burgundy. Over the years there has been some evaporation but with a little luck this wine will be great.

The 1961 Pommard comes from a vineyard in southern Burgundy. The vineyard is one of the two best in Pommard, and 1961, like 1969, was a knockout year in Burgundy. Note the Marine Corps Mess sticker on the label. The old wine guy was once a young wine guy and was the only doctor ever to become wine purchasing officer at the Marine Corps Base at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. He has always felt that he has done his best for his country.



It's time to open all of these bottles. I would be happy with four great bottles and two disasters. But that's the beauty of drinking old Burgundy. It's either wine for the gods or good only for vinegar.

Old Burgundy is a gamble.
