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RUN for the ROSES

Some facts and figures about horseracing's biggest day and a new Club tradition to celebrate it!

We're talking Derby here! Join us in celebration of the 148th Run for the Roses at The Toledo Club's inaugural Kentucky Derby Party on Saturday, May 7.

Come and EAT southern fare, DRINK bourbon mint juleps, and MERRILY bet on your favorites. Come decked out in your finest Derby fashion (hats and bow ties are perfect).

Here are some fun facts and interesting finds about the Kentucky Derby to keep you on "track!"



America's Historic Racetrack

The first race at Churchill Downs happened in 1875 and was won by a horse named Aristides, ridden by an African American jockey, Oliver Lewis.

At the turn of the 20th century, Churchill Downs had fallen into financial trouble, and was facing a strong possibility of closing.

In 1902, a man by the name of Colonel Matt Winn was hired to change the track's situation. Through his direction he formed a group of investors and was able to market venue events, the first being the bringing of the Kentucky Derby to Churchill Downs. He made it a scene of fashion and influence among the wealthy.

Churchill Downs quickly became known as the track for the race called "Run for the Roses," "the greatest two minutes in sports" and "the first jewel in racing's Triple Crown."

Today, besides home to the Kentucky Derby, Churchill Downs hosts the Kentucky State Fair, music festivals and the famous Kentucky Derby Museum.

Churchill Downs was founded by Meriwether Lewis Clark, Jr., grandson of the explorer William Clark. Mr. Clark leased the land from

his two uncles, John and Henry Churchill, then built and named the track after them when it was completed. In 1875, Meriwether Clark enlisted three stake races: the Kentucky Derby, the Oaks, and the Clark Handicap, all of which still run today.



Best Seat in the House

The Mansion, an 8,000-square-foot amphitheater located on the 6th floor at Churchill Downs, is an exclusive secret clubhouse for those "too rich" for Millionaires Row. It is strictly reserved for 320 of the crème de la crème of high society. And the only way to experience Southern hospitality at its finest is by invitation.

Each individual ticket costs between \$7,000 and \$14,000. You must be accompanied by an assigned, personal concierge to enter and exit the Mansion. On your way in, take note of the key-shaped doorhandles, complete with The Mansion's logo.

This exclusive, best-kept-secret club comes with plenty of perks. This group of Derby royalty are pampered by the most elite chefs and bartenders, flown in from all over the world. Mansion invitees enjoy unparalleled world class food and fully-stocked spirits, access to almost any area of Churchill Downs, a betting "advisor," and a perfect outdoor area right on the finish line. Word has it that there is a fully-stocked Chanel makeup counter in the ladies room.

The Mansion opened in 2014, replacing the Media Center, where members of the local press would gather to cover the Kentucky Derby. I forgot to mention, the price for a table of eight goes for \$27,200. How many would you like? First you'll have to wait for your private invitation in the mail.





An Iconic Symbol x2

The Twin Spires debuted in 1895, about twenty years after Churchill Downs was built. They were ready in time for the 21st running of the Derby.

Joseph Dominic Baldez, a 24-year draftsman, was asked to draw up the blueprints for Churchill Downs' new grandstand. He wanted to create twin spires to flank the grandstand, to convey a sense of power and strength. Through the years, the Twin Spires have become an iconic symbol, with 2020 marking their 125th anniversary.

The spires have been compared to church towers or steeples by many, but their significance to race fans and citizens of Kentucky serves as a reminder of the Derby as "Louisville's premier event." Each spire displays a delicate, steeply pitched, slate-roofed cupola, their ornate style contrasting with the simplicity of the grandstand. Their image has become as important to Churchill Downs as the Derby itself, the frosty mint juleps, and the garland of roses.

Joseph Dominic Baldez never attended a single Kentucky Derby. He did attend other


races, just not the Derby. It was said that he felt a personal responsibility for the Twin Spires. He knew he would experience an unbearable sense of loss if something were to happen involving the spires that would cause any kind of tragedy.

A Horse Whose Name Reigns Supreme

Secretariat, widely considered the greatest horse of the second half of the 20th century, was a chestnut stallion, affectionately called "Big Red." This 1973 Triple Crown (made up of the Kentucky Derby, Preakness Stakes, and Belmont Stakes) winner had three white "socks," a cocky demeanor, and won the hearts of millions all over the world.

At the Kentucky Derby, Secretariat broke out of the gate last, worked his fast magic, and crossed the finish line clocked at 1:59.40. Secretariat's speed record for both the Derby and the track itself still stands today. Monarchos, who won the Kentucky Derby in 2012, has the second fastest time in history, with a time of 1:59.97.



Two weeks after winning the Derby, Secretariat won the Preakness at Pimlico. His victory wasn't questioned, only his time, which remained in question for 40 years. Members of the Derby Racing Form had clocked Secretariat at 1:53.40, which again was a new track record. However, the officials at Pimlico posted his time at 1:54.40. To put an end to the decades-long speculation, in June 2012 the Maryland Racing Commission used a forensic review of the race to determine that Secretariat ran even faster then either of the debated times, actually winning the Preakness at a time of 1.53—flat!

"Secretariat-mania" was in full swing as he prepared for the Belmont, the final leg of the Triple Crown. Running against four horses, Secretariat opened the lead with every stride, winning for the third time in a row with a record time of 2:24. Secretariat won by 31 lengths in front of second place, making him the first horse in 25 years to win the Triple Crown. His career accomplishments were monumental and he was loved like no other horse in history.

In late 1973 he was put out to stud, where he sired nearly 600 foals, including one horse that sold for over a million dollars. Unfortunately, his offspring were failures on the racetrack. Some of his grandsires were a little more successful in the racing world.

Secretariat spent his final years frolicking in the fields of Claiborne Farm in Paris, Kentucky. He was always happy to show off that "cocky



The Blanket of Roses

Ask a Kentucky Derby horse if they would rather receive a practical gift for winning, like some oats or maybe a delicious lump of sugar. Or, how about a 122-inch-long garland of over 400 lush red roses that weighs 40 pounds?

The rose variety used in the garland that is draped across the winning horse is known as the "Freedom Rose." It is cultivated for its impressive bloom size, stem length, longevity, and perfect color, aptly named "patriotic red." The Freedom Rose was named after the events of 9/11 in tribute to the victims, their families, and the men and women serving in the armed forces that were ground responders.

For the past 44 years, Kroger's master floral designers in Louisville have hand sewn the roses onto green satin backing, with the seal of the Commonwealth of Kentucky on one end, and a logo of the Twin Spires


with the number of the current race on the other end (this year is the 148th Kentucky Derby). In addition, each garland is adorned with a "crown" of roses (the number of roses varies each year, with one rose for each horse competing), green ferns, and ribbon, and has a single rose that points upward. This single rose symbolizes the struggle and heart necessary to reach the Derby's Winner's Circle.

Each year on Derby eve, the public is invited to attend and watch the garland receive a police escort in its 10–12-hour trip to Churchill Downs, where it is guarded by the US Navy until it is presented to the new winner.

History has it that originally pink and white roses were presented to the Derby winner. The red rose became the official flower in 1904. The garland as we know it today was introduced in 1932 for the 58th running. It was 1925 when New York sports columnist Bill Corum famously dubbed the Kentucky Derby the "Run for the Roses."

demeanor" for the hundreds of visitors that came to see him each year. You never had to beg Secretariat to pose for a photo —he was a big ham at heart. In the fall of October 1989, the 19-year-old champion was euthanized for laminitis, a very painful and incurable hoof condition. He is buried, whole, on Claiborne Farm and still has a following of fans who visit to see his grave and pay their respects. R.I.P. Secretariat.

Secretariat had many unheard-of accomplishments that have never been repeated. Right before the Belmont Stakes, Sports Illustrated, Newsweek, and Time Magazine all featured him on their covers in the same week.

He didn't even know he was a Hollywood star!

A Very Attractive Drink

A signature silver or pewter cup is part of the joy of sipping a mint julep cocktail. The cup becomes frosty when heaps of crushed ice are added to the combination of bourbon, mint, sugar and water. It looks elegant with that touch of fresh mint added on top. Some racegoers will agree that the julep, officially made the Derby signature cocktail in 1939, is the best tradition of all at the Kentucky Derby.

Around 120,000 mint juleps are sold at the Kentucky Derby each year. Reports show that these mint cocktails have been priced as high as \$2,500 each on race day.

The mint julep was born as a daily health elixir and originated in Persia (224–675 A.D.) as a rose water bath called "gulab" for imperial

princesses. The julep blossomed in the American south in the early 1800s. It is said to have traveled west to Kentucky from Virginia. Cheers to the julep!

It's All About the Fashion

Finding the perfect Derby hat has become a fun ritual one that is part Southern and part spectacle (and said to bring good luck!).

Churchill Downs on Derby Day looks like a colorful runway. Hats are displayed in a rainbow of colors, every shape and size, embellished with flowers, bows, ribbons, beads,

feathers, and more. Men can be seen sporting fedoras along with the Derby's official men's accessory - the bow tie. Racegoers proudly strut their individual statement pieces, to show off their best, to be "seen," and to become a part of the brightly-colored Derby experience.



The Kentucky Derby hat has been a tradition since its debut in 1875. Churchill Downs founder Colonel Meriwether Clark Jr., and his wife Mary, were responsible for bringing style and fashion back to Louisville. They were avid travelers and were inspired by the well-dressed pageantry they found at European races in France

and England.



Dinner will be in the Founders Dining Room at 7 PM with tables of eight. The Professor will lead us on a journey through Scotland and its distilleries that may wind up on the low road.

The price is \$150 per person.

Tradition has it that cigars and bold stories may be available in the Red Room following dinner.

NOSE: Orange and lemon peels, joined by sea breeze and vanilla custard. **PALATE:** Smoke begins light and coastal, develops throughout with a hint of well-toasted malt. Sultanas and redcurrants sit beneath it. **FINISH:** Long-lasting smoky elements.

Caramelized red onion/raspberry compote

NOSE: More like Lapsang Souchong tea than Lapsang Souchong! One of the smokiest noses from Islay. It's big, very, very concentrated, and redolent of iodine, sweet spices, good, mature Sherry and creamy vanilla. Stunning. PALATE: Very thick and rich. A massive mouthful of malt and Sherry with good fruity sweetness, but also a wonderful sweetness. Big, powerful peat and oak. FINISH: Long, spicy finish, figs, dates, peat smoke, vanilla.

Seared salmon Smoked cheddar Tasso grit

Balvenie Doublewood 17

Warm Acacia honey and green apples on the **NOSE**, leading to warm winter spices, vanilla and honeysuckle on the **PALATE**. The **FINISH** is gloriously long with notes of vanilla and honey.

> Coffee-rubbed double bone lamb Cocoa demi-glace

Aberlour 18

NOSE: Creamy, like melted vanilla ice-cream. Fruity and honeyed. **PALATE:** Fresh juicy apples and oranges, before sherry kicks in with supple sultanas and vanilla. **FINISH:** Intricate with chocolate raisins and oily caramel notes.

> Prosciutto wrapped sea scallop Manchego risotto/lemon beurre blanc

Glenfiddich Age of Discovery 19

NOSE: Toffee and vanilla play out first followed by a fruity cocktail of cox apples and spiced orange. PALATE: Caramel and vanilla give way to a leathery quality; with water a spiciness arrives with nutmeg and cardamom notes. FINISH: Majestically long with apple tart and warm spicy flavours. Overall, a great follow-up to the Madeira cask, equally complex and delicious without replicating what has gone before. Top notch!




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LET'S PUT OUR HANDS TOGETHER FOR JIM GOTTRON

For decades, Jim Gottron has been one of the brightest lights on the Toledo jazz scene. He's spent about four of those decades brightening the Red Room with our monthly Members' Jams. On March 18th, The Toledo Club will sparkle even brighter as Jim's friends and colleagues gather in the Red Room for a special Members' Jam in tribute to his long and storied career as musician, piano tuner and friend. Please join us for an evening of music, stories and fellowship in honor of Jim Gottron. For those who are not familiar with Jim's career, here is a profile written by Toledo's jazz historian, Doug Swiatecki.


im Gottron has tuned pianos for Liberace, Oscar Peterson, Johnny O'Neal, Count Basie, Larry Fuller, Stanley Cowell, Mitzi Gaynor, George Shearing, Ahmad Jamal, Ray Charles, and an endless list of jazz royalty in the United States. He was also the house piano tuner for legendary venues such as the Aku-Aku and Rusty's Jazz Café, and he tuned for the oldest jazz club in the world, Baker's Keyboard Lounge, in Detroit.

In Toledo, Jim has tuned for everyone and every venue including the Toledo Symphony, the Valentine Theater, the Toledo Jazz Orchestra, The Toledo Club, Lucille's Jazz Lounge, Rusty's Jazz Café, Murphy's Place, the Toledo Country Club, Carranor Hunt and Polo Club, the Sylvania Country Club, and jazz bars and clubs loved, but long forgotten.

Jim Gottron grew up in Fremont, Ohio, but moved to Toledo, where all the action was in the 1960s. However, before coming to Toledo, Jim pulled off something that perhaps only one other person in the country, at that time, had accomplished. While he was still 18 years old, Jim passed the exam to become a Registered Piano Technician. There was some fuss in the union about having such a young man in its midst, but the leadership was firm; Gottron passed the exam, and he was now certified.

The early 1960s brought Jim to Toledo where he immediately became friends with Aretha Franklin's former musical director, Claude Black. Their love of the piano and jazz was mutual. Black was a fixture at Gottron's place, where, with a precisely tuned piano on hand, hours of practicing and jazz reviews commenced. Black, well known in Detroit as well as Toledo,





suggested to Baker's Keyboard Lounge that Jim was the solution to their piano tuning needs. Incidentally, that marks Jim as one of the few people to have tuned that club's Steinway piano, which Art Tatum personally selected for the club many years ago.

Recently Gottron recounted a great story. During a memorable Oscar Peterson performance at Baker's, Peterson got up from the piano and said, "ladies and gentlemen, the piano is dying." Jim Gottron was in the audience, and the ownership of Baker's asked Jim, "Do you have your tools?" He certainly did. Jim reported, "I put a tuning on it during intermission." The tuning was miraculous, and Peterson was very pleased. He said to the crowd, "How about a hand for Jim."

Rusty Monroe took an immediate liking to Jim Gottron, and he quickly became a close advisor to the club on all things piano. Jim tuned pianos for Rusty's, and he helped Rusty find and negotiate the purchase of pianos for the club, including the Baldwin that many recall with such fondness. When Eddie Abrams wasn't on break, Jim could be found at the keyboard, unless guys like Claude Black, Gene Parker, Mark Kieswetter, or that pesky teenager, Larry Fuller, and other pianists were holding forth.

Knowing Claude Black in the 1960s meant knowing Clifford Murphy, since the two local jazz icons formed a musical association that began in the late 1940s. Gottron and Murphy became well acquainted and good friends. The two anchored the Red Room Members' Jam group for years. Another lengthy solo booking for Gottron was at the Commodore Perry Hotel in Toledo, Jim Gottron at Murphy's Place, pictured here with jazz pianist Johnny O'Neal.

where he performed for five years in the Quarterdeck Lounge.

When Clifford Murphy and Joan Russell decided to open Murphy's Place, they turned to Jim to help acquire the club's first grand piano. When it needed upgrading, they again turned to Gottron to help find the Yamaha C6 piano. Claude Black could be heard at the keyboard almost every night. Among the many jazz pianists that played on the Yamaha C6 at Murphy's Place are Freddie Cole (Nat's brother), Cyrus Chestnut, Monte Alexander, Larry Fuller, Johnny O'Neal, and a host of others that passed through Toledo, all enjoying the lovely tones the house piano created. Now that piano sits on the stage in a first-class jazz venue in Toledo: Lucille's Jazz Lounge.

Plan now to join us at 6 PM on March 18 for a tribute to Jim Gottron in the Red Room, where many of his friends will join in Toledo's best jam session. Reservations would be a good idea, because a strong turnout of local musicians and fans is expected. ©

NEW SQUASH LOUNGE GETS READY FOR PRIME TIME By Eddie Charlton

This past season we've witnessed record numbers on our squash courts—180 players in the Winter Squash League, over 200 active players and more than 40 junior squash players participating in our junior squash programming. With more people comes less space.

Much to my wife's frustration, I'm always thinking, problem solving and trying to come up with new ways to make the experience better for the membership. The space we've utilized for our new squash lounge was formerly known as "the swamp." It was a bare bones storage area that had a history of leaking until the parking lot was resurfaced and levelled. With space starting to get tight behind court 4 and plans to continue the growth of the program, more space was much needed and this was a logical option. Chad Bolles, Rich Effler



and I discussed the idea in a little more detail and pulled the trigger to start work on the project in December.

The progress on the project was impressively fast. Coming from a squash background where the smallest technical change can take months to see a difference, this project moved along hour by hour. Within a day the walls had been removed and a pile of rubble left behind. Ceiling grids went up fast, ceiling tiles the same way. As I write this the flooring guys are prepping the surface to lay our LVT and I'm told it will be done by end of day tomorrow! The vision for the space is for it to be a comfortable hang-out space for all-a place to watch football on the weekend after a squash match (we'll have multiple TVs for conflicting games/sports), a space for parents to sit in comfort (with a choice of seating options) while waiting for their kids to finish junior squash programming, and a fun space for kids to watch TV (we have an area designed for the kids with a games console, a couch and beanbag chairs) while mom or dad play their league match. We're installing a total of six TVs for a great viewing experience.

We haven't finalized exact finishes yet but the vision is for a couple of large couches, some individual seating, high-top tables for work spaces as well as a pool/pingpong combination table. It really will act as a versatile space for everyone. Once complete, the project will have had an investment of more than \$40,000, all of which has been self-funded by the squash program through court advertising, the Winter Squash League and other events. I encourage you all—squash player or not—to come down and take a look. We look forward to welcoming you to "The Lounge."



We sent out information on the membership dues before the end of last year. I'm including them here for you to refer to, in the event you need the information. We will include them in upcoming issues of *Topics* as well!


