

AT THE TOLEDO CLUB



ver the years, Topics has been writing about paintings displayed tastefully throughout The Toledo Club. First-time visitors and

members who walk into the Club are often struck by the elegant atmosphere and history that these paintings bring to the Club. The art collection has added to the enjoyment and ambiance of the Club's already unique character and long history. A few objects in the art collection are truly museum pieces. Exactly how The Toledo Club came by most of its paintings and other works of art leave much to conjecture, because little was documented prior to the 1970s. Much of this art is from early Toledo Club contributors as well as Northwest Ohio area contributors.

We also know that George Stevens, the first director of the Toledo Museum of Art, was very helpful in steering art donations to the Club as well as lending some of the Museum's art to the Club. In the early days of the Toledo Museum of Art, it was customary to loan museum paintings to various local businesses and institutions, including The Toledo Club, but this practice was later discontinued.

The first formal Toledo Club art committee was formed in the late 1970s and Allen Owen served as chairman. The first project was to inventory and appraise the Club's collection, something that had never been done before. Since then, the Club and its art committee have acquired some excellent additions to the collection.

We had no audio/visual representation of the Club's art collection that would bring together knowledge of the paintings and

their artists—until Brian Kennedy came to town to lead the Toledo Museum of Art. Brian was the director, president and CEO of the Toledo Museum of Art from September 2010 to June 2019, and he had done volumes of research and had extensive knowledge about our Toledo Club art pieces. In 2019, Mr. Kennedy was invited by Toledo Club member enthusiasts to construct a video tour to help audiences appreciate our treasured paintings. Videographer Chuck Schmitt suggested that the video of Mr. Kennedy be shot continuously, and without edits, to allow Brian to elaborate as he moves from place to place. Through this video tour, you can enjoy his in-depth explanations of the art works themselves, as well as information about the artists and the inspiration behind their creations.

The resulting video is remarkable in that it includes all of the Club's major art pieces, as well as his comments on significant architectural features of the Club. It's an amazing tour and should be seen by every member. (OR codes to access the video tour can be found at the bottom of page 9.)

The Club's collection includes several paintings by Edmund Osthaus (1858-1928). Brian Kennedy said in his Toledo Club art collection video tour that Osthaus "is the most famous artist from

Toledo besides Joseph Kosuth" (who is still living) and "also one of the greatest painters of sporting dogs in the history of art." Osthaus had developed a passion for art and the outdoors at a young age. He had plenty of opportunity to practice his skills by sketching sheep, deer and other game that wandered through the fields and nearby forests. He embarked on a classical art education at the Royal Academy of Fine Arts in Dusseldorf. When his family emigrated to America, it was in Toledo that Osthaus met The Blade publisher and art lover David Ross Locke. Locke recognized Osthaus' talent and hired him as director of the new Toledo Art Academy. Osthaus' experience in the world of competitive sporting dogs provided abundant subject matter for his paintings. The Toledo Club now owns four Osthaus oil-on-canvas paintings— Over the Fence, Stag Hounds, Beltons on Point and First Crossing.

As a men-only club for decades, the Club brought women in initially by bringing in a variety and range of romantic portraits of women (the Club opened its dining room to women in 1920). There are several portraits in the Red Room which should not be overlooked. Brian Kennedy has a detailed description of the painting *Girl in Red* (shown on the cover) attributed to Walter Dean Goldbeck (1882-1925) in the video tour. "The lady is certainly adorned in red, and a good half of the painting is taken up by her very flaunty dress, and

she gestures to her right towards a fan in a provocative and somewhat seductive manner." Another painting that may also catch one's eye in the Red Room is When Sylvia Walks by Louis Betts (1873-1961) Louis received his initial art instruction from his father and painted his first portrait while taking violin lessons, exchanging the portrait of his violin instructor for the cost of his lessons. When Sylvia Walks was gifted to the Club by another distinguished Toledo Club member, Arthur J. Secor, in 1929.

Other famous art pieces in the collection that Brian Kennedy mentions in his video tour include The Rocky Coast by John Ross Key (1837-1920); Winter Rigor by John Carlson; Death Valley at Sunrise by Ferdinand Harvey Lungren (born in Toledo in 1857); The Battle of Lake Erie by Carleton Chapman (1860-1926); Seascape by Thomas Parkhurst; Harlen River Bridge by Max Kuene; The Surging Tide by George Dinckel; and many others.

The highlight of Brian's video tour is the Founders Dining Room. Mr. Kennedy gives detailed introductions to each of the portraits of men who shaped Toledo and The Toledo Club. Those distinguished men include Edward Drummond Libbey, Michael Joseph Owens, John North Willys, William Edward Levis, David Ross Locke, and Morrison Remick Waite.

In addition to the paintings, the video tour also talks about the Club's cut glass collection. It celebrates Toledo's rich history of glass manufacturing, which was initiated by the move of Edward Drummond Libbey to Toledo from Massachusetts in 1888. At that time he brought his New England manufacturing company to Toledo. Several examples of Libbey glass on display at the Club

are from the 1880s to 1905. The Club's collection of glass pieces, located in the Red Room, tells the story of different types of specially cut glass. The cuts were made in the smooth surface of the glass by skilled craftsmen who would move the glass around against a piece of metal or stone to create patterns on the glass. The heyday of cut glass in America is known as the Brilliant Period, spanning from the late 1870s to WWI. The Club's glass collection also includes Steuben glass from Corning, New York, Bohemian glass from the Czech Republic, Tiffin glass from Tiffin, Ohio and others.

While the membership and decor may change in the years to come, The Toledo Club's art will remain, providing a constant and vigorous addition to the special charm and history of our Club. 📭





















New Energy in our Membership Committee











COMEBACK: THE SILVER COLLECTION ON THREE

ome of you may have noticed the recent appearance of a lovely display of silver serving pieces and dinnerware on the Club's third floor. Exit the elevator and look ahead and a little to the right. There it is. A collection of beautiful, gleaming specimens of Club history. It's time to shed a bit of light upon how and why this display came to be.

It is through the concerted efforts of Bert Mills and Kim Kearns that we can now enjoy looking at this little slice of Club history. These particular pieces were part of the estate of the late Dr. Donald Knepper. Mr. Mills purchased the items from the estate, and then generously donated them back to the Club. Upon acquisition, the pieces were blackened with years of tarnish. Kim Kearns then stepped up and took on the daunting task of polishing them to their original splendor. She must have almost worked her fingers to the bone in doing so. Thank you, Bert and Kim!

The use of many silver and silver plate items harkens back to another time, when all the fine clubs, hotels and even ocean liners served practically everything in silver serving pieces. To see tables set with such elegance was splendid and memorable. The unfortunate side was that it was costly, both to purchase and to maintain. I was told that at one time the Club employed one person for the sole purpose of polishing the silver. Clara, who has worked at the Club for over 40 years, spoke of a time when she was one of three employees that took turns polishing silver. I remember some silver pieces being used at the dinner table, and not so very long ago.

Many of the items on display have The Toledo Club logo on them. Others have the Club's name on the bottom, along with that of the maker or supplier. The maker was the International Silver Company. The supplier was what is now Broer-Freeman Jewelers— now owned by long-time Toledo Club

member David Cameron. The Broer-Freeman Company was first established in 1877 by Jacob Jebediah Freeman. At that time, it went by the name of the J.J. Freeman Company. It was later known as Broer-Freeman and still is today. Mr. J.J. Freeman lived until 1926, at which time the name change may have taken place. (Ohio documentation indicates between 1926 and 1932). The reason for relaying this information is that it is an indicator of the age of some of the items. The markings on the bottom of a few of the them include "J.J. Freeman Co." This indicates that some pieces are most likely from 1932 and prior, while the others appear to be from that time and up until the 1940s.

It does seem unusual to see the name of the seller along with a trademark on tableware of any sort. There was a time when important jewelers and department stores had their company name included, along with the maker's mark, on both silver holloware and fine china. I was unable to find a clear timeline as to when vendors had their names included, but my research pointed toward it being from the late Victorian era until around the time of World War II. I have come across pieces of Limoges, Royal Doulton and Minton that have had the name of important retail establishments along with the maker's marks. My own pieces, which have the names of Tiffany and Marshall Fields on them, were manufactured in the late 1800s through about 1910.

Broer-Freeman really deserves a bit of the spotlight as well. To have your company name on silver and china tableware in the past meant you were an important vendor, as I mentioned. In all of my years of collecting I have found only important well-established jewelers and department store names on such items. Broer-Freeman was located at the corner of Erie and Jefferson. Everything about it, the architecture, interior and even the corner location, were very much like Tiffany's on 57th and 5th in New York City. There was no better place in town to acquire silver and tableware. The second floor was beautifully appointed. Four-sided oak and beveled-glass display cases exhibited the finest silver and silver plate holloware and porcelain pieces. Tables were set with the china, crystal, Shoppers could choose a gift, or something special

and flatware choices of the current brides-to-be.

Kim Kearns, pictured below, polished the Club's silver pieces back to their original shine. The collection's display cabinet sits on the third floor across from the elevators by the stairs up to four.

for their own home, and they would then be sent downstairs for wrapping. Once in the packing area, items were beautifully wrapped with handmade bows if a gift, or with plain white paper and elegant blue ribbons imprinted with "Broer-Freeman." Then the parcels were delivered by courier to the lucky recipient's home—another example of by-gone elegance. An important jeweler supplying an important club, both big players in Toledo history. In the days of big box stores and chains, it's nice to have such a historic local business live on today.

Some of you are probably wondering how these silver pieces ended up in the doctor's estate. Mr. Mills assures me that it was not acquired by nefarious means, although a few people have alluded to such. He told me that in the past, the Club would hold sales. Items no longer being used by the Club would be offered to the members for purchase. I would love to have a time machine and revisit one of those sales.

Our Toledo Club still remains the most elegant in Toledo, but can you imagine what it was like to have your dinner served using pieces from the collection? Next time you're at the Club for dinner in the Founders Dining Room, stop and take a look. Or make the trip up to the third floor for the sole purpose of seeing this display. Try to imagine the dining room with the glistening silver, members dining in attire in the styles of Downton Abbey, The Great Gatsby or 1930s Hollywood.


I'm grateful that we get to partake in this glimpse of the past. Thanks to the generosity and hard work of two of our members, we're still able to enjoy it today. 📀


