

he theater arts in downtown Toledo are alive and well, and offer something for everyone. Maybe you're unaware of what's available, or you simply got out of the habit of attending live shows since the pandemic. Some of you may already be passionate about patronizing the theaters on a regular basis. Either way, you may be interested in a deeper look into our three downtown theater options.

Theater arts matter.

I had delightful interviews with some individuals that are connected to all three theatrical groups. I came away from the interviews realizing that we all share many of the same feelings and thoughts about live shows and the theater community, but one remark really stood out. Toledo Club member Debra Calabrese said, "Art saves lives." It sounds

like a big, bold statement, but yes, she is correct. Having witnessed immense changes in children exposed to the arts through the years, Deb knows. I had witnessed situations which I knew had changed lives, definitely for the better. But not until talking with Deb had I thought of art literally saving lives. Deb saw a demographic that I did not. She has acted, taught and directed in the theater community for

decades and has experience from fine theaters to inner city schools. She has a dance studio named for her at the Toledo School for the Arts. She conveyed some very moving stories to me from her experiences. And yes, I'm certain she is correct—art saves lives.

Theater arts in particular can open a new world for the young. Those at risk of falling into an atmosphere of violence can find another option than the streets, and the extremely shy can break out of their shells. It has been proven that kids that have participated in the theater do better in many areas of education and communications. It carries on through adult life.

The arts are important. They help us at any age. They give us a method of escape from stress, the daily grind, and boredom. Sometimes we laugh, sometimes we cry. The comedy and tragedy masks say it well.

> While attending a show we learn things, take a mini vacation, produce a new batch of endorphins due to learning a new song. Art feeds our souls, and theater does it in the here and now. Just like in the musical Brigadoon, it all rises up and is magical and compelling, and then it disappears into the mist. But a good show lives on in our hearts and minds.



Toledo Repertoire Theatre on 10th Street

Often referred to as the Toledo Rep or sometimes just the Rep, this is the theater with which we are planning our first "artnership." We have Dinner and a Show coming up June 24—you can read about that on page 10.

Founded in 1933, the Rep has been entertaining audiences for 90 years. The structure is relatively small, the space intimate, and yet the productions can be impactful and memorable.

I've had the privilege of being a part of the Rep—in the audience, acting, directing, and teaching. I have seen it all, and I can tell you that a lot more goes into a production than you realize. You arrive, the curtain opens, and what you witness can seem to be effortless, but truly, a lot of work from a lot of people has taken place for this to come to be. Planning starts way ahead when the season is chosen, rights applied for, and the production team assembled. Then the auditions, and the show is cast. Then eight to ten more weeks of set building, costuming, blocking, and rehearsing. Many weeks ahead of that the director is planning, envisioning their cast, not knowing what the cast will be like until the hopeful actors show up on audition days.

You'll see in some of the photos a bit of the preparing for a show that takes place several weeks in advance. One of the interesting things is how the set comes to be. The set designer will usually build a small model set, so the set builder can see what is needed. In the case of the Rep, the set will probably be built in the "brown building," a separate structure from the main theater that houses building and rehearsal space. The set builder may actually build the entire production set in the "brown building" and then dismantle it and take it to the main stage piece by piece to be rebuilt and readied for the show. This is all so that the theater can perform a current production and create a new production in tandem. Lights and sound boards need plots and cues set. The stage manager orchestrates the entire production. So much goes into it all, but the rewards of a good show are priceless.

The Rep offers a season with something for everyone, from the opening of their season (this year, Tick, Tick, Boom), the holiday tradition of A Christmas Carol, and many others, from Broadway,

Off-Broadway, and sometimes local writers.

Theater classes for children and teens are available, as are Young Rep Productions, performed by young people. Anyone can audition for any of the Rep's productions.

The Valentine Theatre



The Valentine Theatre is the only remaining gem from the elegant theatres of the past which were in downtown Toledo. We are so lucky to have the Valentine saved and resurrected. The Valentine Theatre opened on Christmas Eve in 1895. The show was Rip Van Winkle, and I have often

imagined the coaches arriving, the snow falling and families stepping out in their finest attire.

I talked with Director of Marketing and PR Matt Lentz, who filled me in on some of the features, history and the future of this wonderful venue. The Valentine has a storied past: it went from hosting important acts and full-scale productions, to vaudeville, then silent movies, talkies, and toward the end of the 20th century, burlesque, and again a movie house. You can learn so much about its history just from looking at the enormous mural in the Grand Lobby, painted by Paul Geiger. It's titled Backstage at the Valentine, and the subject matter is some of the thousands of performers that had graced the Valentine stage between 1895 to 1920. The mural is the largest installed indoor painting in Toledo, measuring 68½ feet in length.

The building was scheduled for the wrecking ball many times, and received a stay of execution just as many times, until finally it was saved and restored. The fight to save the building went on for 21 years. Finally, a 28-million-dollar renovation took place and was unveiled in 1999. Since the renaissance of the theater it has been a performance

venue, hosting events as varied as Broadway reviews, full theatrical productions, operas, and ballets. Performers are from local companies, national touring companies and from around the world. Even high school productions utilize the space.

One very special aspect of the Valentine Theatre is that they are accessible to everyone in the community. Assistive listening devices are available, as are easy-to-access elevators. They even have a special Sensory-Friendly Family Series.

Behind the scenes at the Valentine is a well-oiled machine, with production crews, electricians, set techs, and stage hands—all pros that do everything as well and as professionally as those at a Broadway theater. I can tell you from experience, they have the best dressing rooms in the area.

As at every theater, there are those that carefully choose the shows, book the venue to local groups, and work at promotion and everyday operations to keep this wonderful relic alive. Jori Jex is the Executive Director that leads the team. Both Jori and Matt assure me that the Valentine Theatre will continue to bring quality entertainment to us as usual. They admit that the pandemic was hard on them, but little by little the patrons are returning. They do really want to see a 100% return, and I think it will be doable soon. Both seem to be quite excited about the upcoming diverse season. At the time of this article going to press, I hadn't seen the line-up yet, but I'm anticipating attending some of the productions—it sounds like it's going to be a great season. Please consider attending a production too. We want this beautiful theater to be around so that future generations are able to enjoy the beauty and elegance of the past and the technology of today.

Actor Collaborative Toledo

Also known as ACT, Actor Collaborative Toledo was founded in 2013 by thespians Jeffrey Albright, Barbara Barkan and John DuVall. The purpose: to bring high-quality, seldom-performed productions to the area.

ACT has performed in many venues and often collaborates with other area theatrical groups. I consider them to be a downtown Toledo theater, due to the fact that they often perform at Trinity Episcopal Church on Adams next door to the Valentine. Most of their choices are powerful, thought-provoking and dramatic. In their own words, they are committed to bringing contemporary off-beat theater to Toledo. Many veteran actors that grace the other stages of Toledo find it an honor to be part of a production by ACT.

If you see an ACT performance at Trinity Episcopal Church, you'll find the venue itself is interesting. Trinity is 160 years old and has a beautiful interior, but you don't sit on hard pews. The area was renovated to have a more comfortable and flexible space to make it more usable for the community. The city helped to build the church


in 1863: when it was renovated it was decided to make it even more accessible and valuable to the community.

The Toledo Repertoire Theatre is presenting their spring musical, Stephen Sondheim's Sunday in the Park with George. In collaboration with the Rep, The Toledo Club is offering a package event. A buffet of classic French cuisine will be served at the Club. after which you can attend a performance of the production at the Rep's 10th Street theater. At the dinner you'll receive your tickets for reserved seating at the show. Since our Club is noted for having the second most important art collection in Northwest Ohio, and given the show's relation to art, it seemed like the perfect production to start a renewed joint effort with the Toledo Rep.

The Rep will also be promoting the dinner to their members and patrons. It's my hope that some of us may discover (or rediscover) the Rep, and that some of the Rep's patrons may discover the wonders of our Club as well.

The price is \$65 per person for both the dinner and show. If you're already a Rep season ticket holder, or if you just want to enjoy the dinner, the dinner-only option is available at \$43 per person. You can make reservations through Eventbrite, or by calling 419-243-2200.

If you're not familiar with the show, Sunday in the Park with George is often considered one of Stephen Sondheim's most important works. It's a multi-generational story of what Sondheim believed the life of artist Georges Seurat may have been like. Little is known

about Georges' personal life, but Sondheim was inspired by his famous painting, A Sunday Afternoon on the Island La Grande Jatte. Sondheim worked his magic and made the painting come to life. This musical is the winner of a Pulitzer Prize and was nominated for ten Tony Awards, including Best Musical.

The show's director, Amy Spaulding-Heuring, spoke with me recently. Amy is an experienced actor and director and is up to the challenge of directing a Sondheim piece. She is thrilled with her cast. The cast members have a vast range of experience, and "all bring incredible gifts and enthusiasm to the show," says Spaulding-Heuring. She goes on to say that the actors portraying George and Dot are establishing a wonderful on-stage relationship and chemistry. An interesting little tidbit that I learned from Amy: the character "Dot" is so named for all the little dots and dashes in Seurat's paintings.

I asked about the show, and what made it special. Amy cited a favorite song, "Children and Art," from the show, saying "it's personal." She said anyone who has children of their own will be moved by the song. She then pointed out that anyone that loves art would be moved as well. As to creative people, "art is your child."

Please join us for what I hope will be the first of many such events to come. • - Eileen Eddy
