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At this year's President's Dinner on September 29, you'll learn about what the evening's impressive presenters are doing to strengthen our city and how one of their philanthropic efforts has a direct tie to the Club!

f you've ever tossed around the idea of attending the President's Dinner in past years and then declined, well, THIS is the year to sign up. Why is that, you might ask?

In addition to keeping home, hearth and clients happy during this ugly last eighteen months like many, The Toledo Club president and the Board had to work many, many hours, Zooming, collaborating, meeting deadlines, communicating with members, and making decisions to keep this Club functioning and viable. Triumphing over this bumpy road came with no compensation, but for the feeling of "we survived." This dedicated group TRULY deserve a Very Big thank-you and show of support. No ticker tape parade, but a round of applause with heartfelt appreciation to Greg Wagoner and the Board would be a nice tribute to their dedication.

Greg has chosen two speakers for the Dinner this year, both visionaries, who are each now contributing to the growth and strength of the Toledo economy, but in different ways. One, now living in Chicago, is investing in human capital, the other, from his Columbus base, in commercial ventures. Pete Kadens, an entrepreneurial Ottawa Hills native with strong emotional ties to this area, is now busy positing philanthropic endeavors. He and the Dinner's other speaker, Frank Kass, have actually invested in (and benefitted from) each other's business ventures. Listening to their insights on the revitalization of our city, and the ways and whys of approaching such investments of time, dollars and energy, could spark and nurture similar endeavors from our members. It's nice to know the landscape as one seeks a path to make Toledo stronger.

Frank Kass is the CEO of Continental Real Estate Companies, based in Columbus. He has identified Toledo as a market with excellent growth potential. His company, which built and owns the very successful Marina Loft apartment complex near Glass City Metro Park just over the river, is building two new downtown hotels that are replacing the Park Inn (weren't we all fascinated with watching the implosion of that old building?) with a Homewood Suites and a Hilton Garden Inn, including an upscale restaurant. Revitalizing downtown with both large-scale housing and commercial projects should provide many opportunities for others.

The Colony Redevelopment (by the Toledo Hospital entrance on Monroe St.) is another of his shovel-ready projects and will break ground this fall. This large, moderately priced apartment complex will be similar to that of the Marina Lofts with many of the same amenities, and will also harbor a Bag of Nails restaurant-bar. The footprint on the area will be significant and also beneficial for ProMedica employees, resident docs, nurses, etc., while providing outside opportunities for adjacent development. Frank and his staff have been quite successful at identifying needs and trends. He'll share just why he thinks Toledo is such a good opportunity at this time.

Pete Kadens, no stranger to this town, is investing in human capital, illustrating his belief in "giving back" to the community which helped shape him. With major financial success in the business world from diverse ventures, this entrepreneur is using his vehicle, Project Hope, to transform lives. He delivered a major surprise to the Scott High School graduates of 2020 and 2021 (plus one parent), to pay all tuition, fees, and room and board to any Ohio public-funded school of higher learning, or to any approved trade school, with the goal of developing talent and encouraging the returning grads to make THEIR contributions to making Toledo Strong. Sixty-five boys and girls, plus seven parents of the 2020 class, have taken advantage of this opportunity, as are fifty-two from the COVID class of 2021! They are attending UT, BGSU, OWENS, Central State, Eastern Michigan, Terra State, and multiple trade schools. Think of the "return-to-Toledo's-future" on this investment!

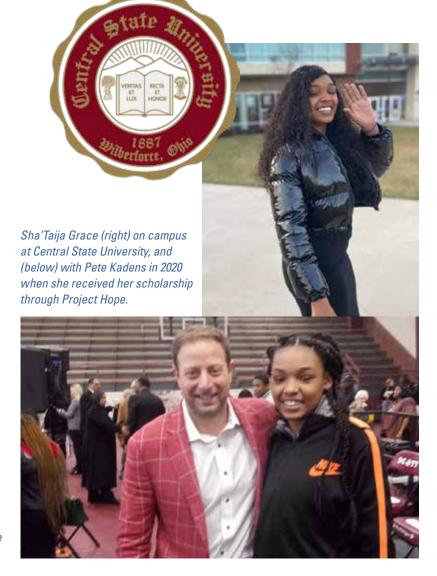

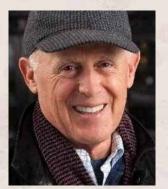

FRANK KASS

Frank Kass, an OSU grad, along with an early partner, formed Continental Real Estate Companies, a commercial construction business based in Columbus, building grocery stores and small town shopping centers. They then added developing, national grocery stores, small office power strips, college



student apartments, hotels, moderately priced apartments (with fun and friendly amenities) and senior assisted living entities, while expanding to many cities as they worked with large regional entities. This business model of following trends and listening to "what the marketplace is telling you" has worked well, as they seemed to alter their course and refocus each decade, thereby weathering some of the financial upheavals during that time. Collaboration and flexibility are key words. He does not seem ready to retire as he thoroughly enjoys leading his team in collaborations from pre-construction to ribbon cutting, and seems to relish bringing on opportunities for prosperity to an area.

PETE KADENS

Peter Kadens, a '93 Ottawa Hills High grad and Bucknell University alum (political science major) is a serial and serious entrepreneur, fostering two very diverse companies, both important to life and commerce in this century—SoCore Energy, involving solar energy and employing more than 5,000 employees, and Green Thumb Industries, the second-largest cannabis company in the world. Presently, he and his family own Headbands of Hope, leveraging the sell-one-donate-one model to ill pediatric patients.

The consequent sale of those two companies has enabled him and his wife, Amy, to pursue philanthropic projects which serve to empower the

underserved of Chicago and of Toledo. He was given the Trailblazer Chicago Award in 2019 and was invited to be a 2019 Henry Crown Fellow of the Aspen Institute (a group of like-minded individuals who have the means to aid in solving society's intractable problems through expansive, creative ventures). Project Hope in Chicago and Project Hope in Toledo, along with his Family Foundation, serve to strengthen their communities by helping the younger

Have you ever seen a 7-year-old girl dressed as the executioner from the Tower of London? No fairy princess costumes for me! So, I have continued the tradition and it is now a family affair.

As for my family, we started decorating with handmade gravestones my dad had made for me to use at our first home, along with a life-sized witch that I put together. Then upon moving to our current home, with about three times the space for a display, we expanded, and expanded, and....

Any time of the year, we are always on the hunt for objects that can be used to make a new prop, thinking and planning all summer long. Many of the Halloween props that we use both at the Club and at our home have come from the usual outlets, such as seasonal Halloween shops. But many of the items are either made by us or acquired from my favorite prop makers, Marsha and Ed Edmunds of Distortions Unlimited

in Colorado, Evil Soul Studios, and FX. I discovered Marsha and Ed when reading an article about Dick Van Dyke and his love of creating a haunted yard. He uses the Edmunds' talents and has them visit his home each year. They have made many items for the film industry as well.

It's customary for my family to start making a prop or two during the summer months. We turn one of our garages into a workshop to create anything from coffins to a horse-drawn Victorian hearse. Currently I am replacing a worn-out prop that I do hope to bring to the Club. You should see the looks on the neighbours' faces as they take their evening walk, just to look up the drive and see my husband and I putting the finishing touches on a coffin. Yep, "they're creepy and they're spooky, the Eddy fam-i-ly" (think TV theme song tune with finger-snapping.) We even had to build a shed to store all of our props and décor. Now it holds only half of the props and décor-we outgrew it!

So, as you can see, I LOVE Halloween. It's fun to share our enthusiasm with members and guests. I really enjoy being the chair of the Halloweek event, and really do hope you will come and join us for one or all of the events this year. Be sure to make reservations. 📀

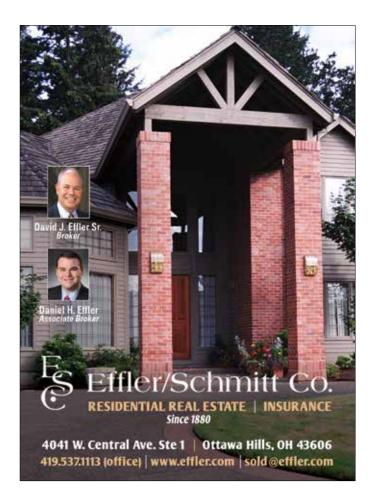
