### Welcome Back to the Club!

September is here and that means the Club is open and ready for the new season. So much going on — where should I start? We have been busy at the Club during our August shutdown. Cleaning, dusting and scrubbing as much as possible has been the focus. We also tackled several maintenance projects we normally cannot get to while open for business. Refinishing the wood floors on the third level is a perfect example. Chef Sean and his staff have used the opportunity to clean and organize the kitchen for the new season.

It was also an opportunity to spend time on the administrative side of things. The food and beverage staff, along with a focus group of several committee chairs, met and discussed opportunities to increase à la carte dining and member event participation. We had lots of ideas and have added new dining opportunities and additional member events to the social calendar, as well as updating the hours of operation to match the historical demand and the venues available this fall. (You can read more about the new dining initiatives on page 17.)

New dining options include early bird specials in the Founders Dining Room from 4 PM to 6 PM, and adding a Steak for Two Night and a Wine and Dine Night once a month. We will continue with the Express Lunch in the Tavern on Thursdays and Fridays as well.

As for member events, we have added an Italian Dinner with wine in November and are working on adding two more gourmet wine dinners this upcoming season. New this year will be a beer dinner in October, with Chef Sean working with one of the local breweries, and we will even try a couple of euchre nights after the holidays. As you can see, we are hard at work to add value to your Toledo Club membership and create more opportunities for you to get downtown and have some fun.

The last thing I want to mention is that we are changing our hours of operations the first two weeks of September after

reopening, to match the past demand. Also, with board approval we have revived the second floor Tavern kitchen by adding needed equipment to make it operational. This will allow us to better serve our members and guests and giving us the ability to revamp our dining hours and venues offered. Starting Monday, September 16, we are switching dinner service on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday from the Founders Dining Room to the Tavern. Casual dining in clubs across the country continues to be the trend and we are excited to offer casual dining at the Club during the week. We will still offer dinner service in the FDR on Thursdays and Fridays.

Membership continues to be a focus, with the emphasis on recruiting and retaining members and this is where all members can help. Scott Libbe has passed the membership chair baton to Christian Pizza, and with it comes some additional energy and focus for the committee. I believe we have positioned the Club in the right direction to bolster net growth. I want to personally thank Scott Libbe for all his efforts over the years and agreeing to stay on the committee to help recruit new members.

Please mark your calendars for all the cool stuff coming up in September, including the Club's Welcome Back Fiesta on Friday, September 6, and Party in the Parking Lot on Friday, September 13. I look forward to seeing everyone back at the Club.



## A New Era for toledo club squash

ypically a slow time of year for squash, the summer of 2019 has been anything but uneventful. The announced departure of Toledo Club squash icon John Seidel, who will be dearly missed as our pro and forever embraced as our friend, kicked off what proved to be a busy summer! With Draft Night on October 24 and the 2019–2020 Toledo Club Squash season only a few short months away, it seems an appropriate time to give an update the search for a replacement squash director.

A search committee, composed of Rich Effler, Todd Berman, Drew Snell, Laura Berling, and GM Jeff Anderson, was quickly formed to spearhead this very important process. John Seidel contributed important networking, framework and feedback for the task at hand as well. After initially posting the job opening on several established squash hubs, the committee received fifteen resumes from candidates literally spanning the globe. The field was narrowed to six frontrunners, and phone interviews were conducted with each remaining candidate. Three exceptional finalists emerged from that group and were invited to The Toledo Club for in-person interviews. As you may have read in the board president's message (page 3), the committee selected Eddie Charlton as the top finalist for the position. Eddie, a former PSA world tour player, was born and raised in Nottingham, England. He spent five of his PSA touring years ranked in the top 100, with a high ranking of 50th in the world. He has been an assistant pro at the University Club of Chicago for the last few years, with a focus on running their junior program, which features a number of highranking junior players.

The next critical phase will begin with extending a big Toledo Club welcome to Eddie as our new squash director. Anyone involved in the Toledo Club squash program knows that the fun, inclusive and approachable culture that John built makes the program so unique. With this transition, it is more important than ever for current members and squash enthusiasts to take that passion for the Toledo Club squash program to a new level. The Fitness Center's Bee Active Contest will run from September 3 to September 30. Both the American College of Sports Medicine and the American Heart Association emphasize that beginning an exercise program is the most important public health message when it comes to physical activity guidelines.

ACSM and the AHA recommend cardiorespiratory exercise and advise adults to get at least 150 minutes of moderate-intensity exercise per week. Exercise recommendations can be met through 30 to 60 minutes of moderate-intensity exercise five days per week or 20 to 60 minutes of vigorous-intensity exercise three days per



week. Physical activity boosts mental wellness, improves physical wellness, enhances immunity, decreases blood pressure, and prolongs optimal health. Without physical activity, the body slowly loses its strength, stamina and the ability to function well.



### THE WINES THE WORLD FORGOT: **Che Great Abite Rieslings** of Germany

On a sunny Saturday in late September 1981, I got a telephone call from Bob Kirtland, priest, Jeffersonian scholar, and wine editor for *The Toledo Blade. The Blade* wanted a *Sunday Toledo Magazine* wine issue, and Bob asked Roger Peluso to do the California wines, the old wine guy to do the German wines, and Bob did the French wines.

There have been only small changes in California and French wine, but as I read my 1981 article on the wines of Germany, there have been major changes. In the early 1980s the wines of Germany were popular the world over and easily obtainable. By the end of the decade their popularity had greatly diminished and they were being replaced by white wines from California, New Zealand, and southern France. This happened for a variety of reasons. The German government itself played a large role in the decline of German wines when they allowed the planting of inferior grapes, increasing the legal yield, and allowing the introduction of modern machinery and mass farming methods.

As the quality went down the rest of the world began to make some really good white table wine. A financial crisis developed that added to the problem. Great German estates such as Schloss Vollrads, the largest vineyard of the Rheingau, financially failed. The owner, whose family had owned the vineyard for over 400 years, committed suicide, and this great old vineyard is currently owned by a bank. At the same time tastes changed from sweet and semi-sweet to the dry, oak-like taste of California white wine. Over the next two to three decades there was a slow revival in the quality of German Riesling, due in part to better methods in the field and the cellar, and a new group of young and dedicated wine makers. Today German Riesling is as good or better than it was 50 years ago, but harder to find in Toledo.

Schloss Vollrads and Wehlener Sonnenuhr 1976, are both from the glory years. Because both are Auslese, the wines will be sweeter, and are made from selected grapes. Although over 40 years old, they are still wonderful.

#### Why is it great?

Imagine a line drawn across a map of northern France and Germany through the battlegrounds of WWI in France and just north of the Rhine River Valley where the Moselle enters the Rhine. Above this line grapes will not ripen in an average year. However, just south of this line are produced what many feel are the finest, lightest and most elegant white wines in the world. This line is at the level of Newfoundland in Canada.

These wines from the Rhine and Moselle River Valley are delicate, fragrant, and always refreshing. With rare exception, they are low in alcohol and shipped in tall slender bottles, brown for the Rhine and green for the Moselle. In this area of Germany it takes 100 days of full sunshine between May and October to produce a good wine. This occurs about five years in a decade. It takes 120 days of full sunshine to produce a great wine. This occurs perhaps twice in a decade. In average years the wine is light and pleasant, in poor years it can be thin, tart, without bouquet, and at times frankly unpleasant. But in those years when the gods of wine are kind and the German winegrower receives his 100 to 120 days of sunshine, the wines are truly glorious and unlike any other drinking experience on the face of the earth — the "bottled poetry" of Robert Lewis Stevenson.

These four bottles are currently available in Toledo. In order of increasing sweetness but still crisp and clean are Qualitatswein, Kabinett, Spatlese, Auslese. The name Prum on a bottle of wine from the Moselle is almost always an indication of a quality wine.



#### The wine laws of Germany

The German nation is a heavily organized and regulated society. This carries through to their laws governing the quantity and quality levels of their wine. Only a PhD with a major in logic could fully understand the German wine laws, but for our purposes I am going to simplify the ten quality levels to a point where at least we can try to understand them. In ascending order the wines will become sweeter, more complex, more expensive, more difficult to produce, and table wines will slowly become dessert wines.

#### The simplified list

- 1 Wein A light table wine mostly sweet because sugar was added.
- 2 Qualitatswein Dry or sweet with some sugar added before fermentation. On a German wine label this suggests a good bottle to drink with a good meal.
- **3 Kabinett** An unsugared excellent table wine.
- 4 Spaetlese a bit sweeter than Kabinett, and still an excellent wine for a special meal. This is a late picking.
- 5 Auslese Again sweeter and stronger than Spaetlese. These wines are made from selected grapes.
- 6 Beerenauslese a dessert wine made from the ripest grapes that have been set aside grape by grape. A sweet very expensive dessert wine.
- 7 **Trockenbeerenauslese** The grapes look like raisins. The wine is fabulously sweet and horribly expensive. To me they are the only dessert wines that can stand up to the great French Sauternes.

#### How to buy German Riesling

Local wine stores stock only limited quantities of German Riesling and most of these are of poor quality. Try to buy wine that is produced by a single vineyard. I have made the rounds of Toledo sellers and find only a few German wines that are of reasonable quality. These wines will have been produced and bottled on the estates and will usually have on the label one of these four delineations: Qualitatswein, Kabinett, Spatlese,



or Auslese. One of Toledo's larger retail wine shops with well over a thousand wines to choose from had only four excellent German Rieslings. Expect to pay \$20 a bottle for a good German table wine. For an excellent bottle expect to pay \$40 to \$50 or more. If you really want a good selection check the large wines stores in New York City, Chicago, and possibly Ann Arbor. An alternative is to buy at auction.

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




